PAPER – III

SECTION - I

NOTE: This section contains five (5) questions based on the following paragraph. Each question should be answered in about thirty (30) words and each carries five (5) marks.

Out of my window late at night I gape
And see the stars but do not watch them really,
And hear the trains but do not listen clearly;
Inside my mind I turn about to keep
Myself awake, yet am not there entirely.
Something of me is out in the landscape.

How much am I then what I think, how much what I feel ?
How much the eye that seems to keep stars straight ?
Do I control what I can contemplate
Or is it my vision that's amenable ?
I turn in my mind, my mind is a room whose wall
I can see the top of but never completely scale.

All that I love is, like the night, outside,
Good to be gazed at, looking as if it could
With a simple gesture be brought inside my head
Or in my heart. But my thoughts about it divide
Me from my object. Now deep in my bed
I turn and the world turns on the other side.

1. Examine how the narrator of the poem treats love as night ?

2. Comment on the rhetorical questions in stanza two.

3. Examine the analogy between mind and room.

4. Comment on the diction of the poem.

5. Examine the abstract quality of the poem.

SECTION - II

NOTE: This section contains fifteen (15) questions each to be answered in about thirty (30) words. Each question carries five (5) marks.

(5×15=75 marks)

6. What is Rhyme Royal ? Comment on its use by Chaucer.

7. Comment on the role of witches in Macbeth.

8. What is meant by "Restoration" in English literary history ?

9. Define 'Mock epic' with examples.

10. Comment on Coleridge’s use of the supernatural.

11. What are the qualities of the romantic prose ?

12. Identify Utilitarianism as reflected in any one of Dickens' novels.

13. Account for Virginia Woolf's choice of stream of consciousness technique.

14. Enumerate the qualities of Shaw’s “The New Woman”.

15. What is “Space fiction” as practised by Doris Lessing” ?

18. Define the concept 'objective correlative'.

19. Bring out the difference between women's writing and feminist writing.

20. Define the role of the reader in contemporary theory.

SECTION - III

NOTE: This section contains five (5) questions from each of the electives / specialisations. The candidate has to choose only one elective / specialisation and answer all the five questions from it. Each question carries twelve (12) marks and is to be answered in about two hundred (200) words.

(12x5=60 marks)

Elective - I

History of English Language, English Language Teaching

21. Write a note on the Scandinavian influence on English language.

22. Trace the morpho-phonemic changes in English language.
23. Discuss the importance of Phonetics in the teaching of foreign languages, with special reference to learners of English in India.
24. Discuss "Language Variety" with special reference to time, region and social class. Give examples from English language.
25. Attempt a critique of the Grammar - Translation method.

OR

Elective - II

European Literature from Classical Age to the Twentieth Century

21. Trace the picaresque tradition in Cervantes' Don Quixote.
22. Examine Chekhov's progressive ideas in The Cherry Orchard.
23. Do you consider Albert Camus' The Outsider as an existentialist novel ? Discuss.
24. Examine Rashkolnikov and Sonya relationship in Crime and Punishment.
25. "Goethe's Faust is a rebel not against Christian dogma only, but against any sort of categorical system of values". Discuss.

OR

Elective - III

Indian Writing in English and Indian Literature in English translation

21. "Contemporary Indian novelists in English are city-centered". Substantiate this view.
22. Examine the portrayal of middle class society in R.K. Narayan's novels.
23. Bring out the major differences between pre-independence and post-independence poetry in Indian English.
24. Attempt a critique of women characters in Karnad's plays.
25. How is Indian English literature indebted to regional literature ?

OR

Elective - IV

American and other non-British English Literatures

21. Discuss Emily Dickinson as a poet of love and death.
22. Evaluate Toni Morrison as a writer of slave narrative.
23. Examine Michael Ondaatje as a diasporic writer.
24. How does Patrick White represent Australian consciousness in his fiction ? Explain.
25. "Chinua Achebe can best be appreciated as a writer of cross-cultural encounter". Elucidate.

OR

Elective - V

Literary Theory and Criticism

21. Examine the neo-classical traits in Dr. Johnson's criticism.

22. Do you agree with the view that Deconstruction is a critique of Structuralism ? Explain.

23. Is it possible to be impersonal as envisaged by T.S. Eliot in his theory of 'impersonality' in art ? Discuss.

24. Examine Stanley Fish's major formulations on Reader-Response criticism.

25. "Post colonialism decentres Eurocentric discourse". Substantiate.

SECTION - IV

NOTE: This section consists of essay type questions of forty (40) marks to be answered in about one thousand (1000) words. Attempt any one of the following :

(40x1=40 marks)

26. Novel as Argumentative and Illustrative Fable.

South-Asian Diasporic Writing.

OR

Translation and Post colonial Writing.
